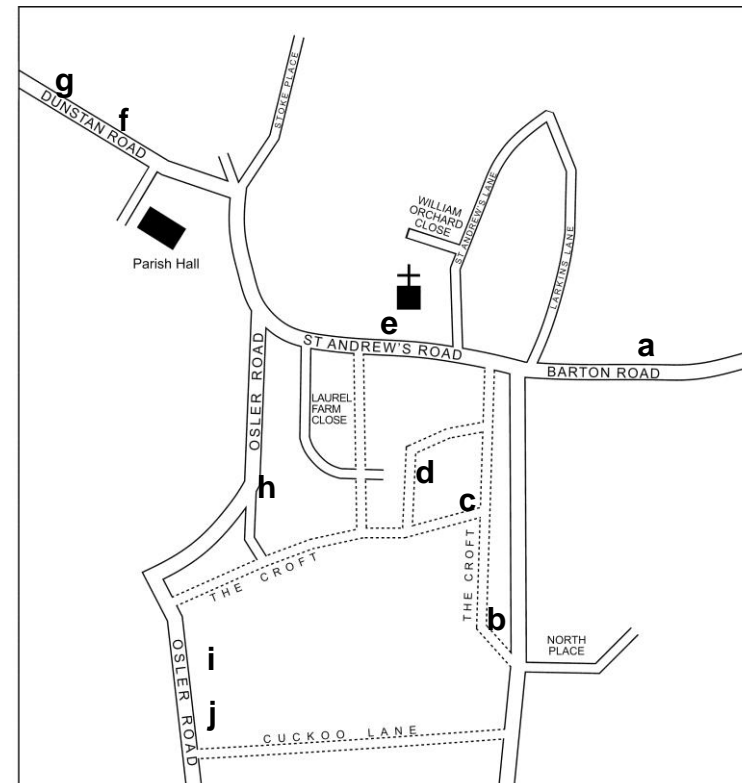
This community event welcomes you to look at, explore and enjoy some lovely gardens today – take your pick, or challenge yourself to visit them all !

- a. The Barn, Barton Road.** Marc Fox and Jinny Blom
A Cottage garden in transition with a small collection of interesting geraniums and high hopes for the future.
- b. Monckton Cottage. 56-58, Old High St.** – Julie Harrod & Peter McCarter.
Walled, long-established woodland garden managed with minimal input and no chemicals. Meadow area, intriguing topiary, unusual plants, peaceful atmosphere, new Mediterranean terrace!
- c. 14, The Croft.** Anne Osborne
Flower beds, climbing plants, shady corner with pot plants, lawn, gravel paths and patio all in a small garden.
- d. 17, Laurel Farm Close** – K.B. Simmons
Traditional cottage garden designed to have textural contrast.
- e. St Andrew's churchyard and bell tower** - Fr. Darren McFarland.
A public garden that is open all the year round. The Bell Tower will be open to visitors from 2.30 until 5.30 and all are welcome. Why not come and see the bells (one of which dates from 1470), perhaps have a go at ringing one, and meet some of the ringers, who will gladly demonstrate and answer your questions. NOTE: Access to the top of the Tower is not permitted. Visitors enter the Tower at their own risk.
- f. Lower Farm, Dunstan Road.** Mary Clarkson & Michael Tappin
A large walled family garden with lovely views and a field with small orchard and vegetable patch. Lots of cottage garden plants. Over the past few years, our aim in the garden has been to replace the invasive geranium oxonianum with plants which extend the flowering season.
- g. 10, Dunstan Road.** Judy Payne
A garden in the makingall suggestions gratefully received

- h. The Old Pound House, The Croft.** - Steve Cowls and Jane Seggons.
The Pound: where stray animals were kept (last used in 1875) along with the village stocks. Wander round the different sections of the garden - a mixture of formal beds and wilder, woodland areas.
- i. White Lodge, Osler Rd.** – Catharine & Denis Mack-Smith; Roger & Frances Little.
A large walled garden with fine mature trees and unusual herbaceous plants, evoking 'Pictures at an Exhibition'.
- j. Greenways, 40, Osler Rd.** – Pam & Nick Coote
Mature garden of Italian and Hispanic inspiration, reflecting love of plants and architecture in equal measure.
